## Parable of the Shrewd Manager

- Estate manager accused of squandering wealth
- Landowner fires manager

## Luke 16:10-12

- ♦ Faithful in little | faithful in much
- ♦ Unjust in little | unjust in much
  - ♦If you aren't <u>faithful</u> in unjust mammon,
  - ♦ Who will trust you with what is true?
- If you aren't faithful in what belongs to another,
- Who will give you what is yours?

## Luke 16:13

- No servant can serve two masters
  - ♦Either: <u>hates</u> one | *loves* the other
  - ♦Or: devoted to one | despises the other
- ♦ You cannot serve God and Mammon

"You are not making a gift of what is yours to the poor person. You are giving him back what is his... The earth belongs to everyone, not to the rich."

- Ambrose of Milan
  - From On Naboth, late 380s

"The bread you hold back belongs to the hungry ... the shoes rotting in your closet belong to those without shoes; the silver which you keep hidden in a safe place belongs to the one in need. You wrong as many people as you could have provided for."

- Basil of Caesarea, 330-379 A.D.
